Journey of Renewal

Dear Friends!,

Starting the summer off in humid Texas with our youth acclimated me to heat this summer. We awoke to 85 degrees most mornings that stayed with us. Our southern friends taught us to drink a lot of water, stay out of the sun, and move slowly. I think that set me up to enjoy the hot, humid days which fell upon here. I might be strange, but I enjoyed the late evenings in Avon Lake when 75 at ten pm felt cool because noon that day was 95, and strolling the lawn in the "cricket" music felt beautiful and good. God's world is always beautiful, but not always comfortable.

Early in June, six of us were asked by the Renewal Coordination team to create a common vision for our congregation. Three men and three women with varied experiences in our church, different perspectives on faith and life, and a common love for our congregation, we gathered five times to sift through evidence gained to discover a clear path ahead that all can tread. The evidence of God's call was what you all spoke and wrote at the three Renewal Events this year (History day, Salt and Light Bible study, Renewal Retreat). We read them all listening for commonalities.

We wrote the things in common on huge sheets of paper and stuck them around us on walls and poster holders so that your words would shine in our eyes. We prayed a lot and had a lot of fun as we thought deep and lightly about what it means to be a part of this church. The experience of being together for this holy purpose was happy and supportive, and made each of us a better and more connected person.

There were several "aha" moments and points in time when we believed the Holy Spirit was clearly communing and communicating with us. At the end, we were humbled to create a textual picture into our future that we think is faithful and true to the unique church that we are. This we shared with the Renewal Coordination team in mid August. After a period of questions and clarifications, the Coordination team understood the vision and felt enlivened and excited by the sense that our Lord is speaking to us through this process. Joy and hope.

I will share our vision through three sermons in September. We will all get a chance to see how we are an intrinsic part of our future. We will all get a chance to see what that looks like and how good it will be. But please do not expect to see a particular plan at this point. The planning is the next step. When you read the common vision, you will see where we are going. It is the big picture, the postcards from the future that we will draw us forward into Christ's particular version of His Kingdom. In October, we will gather as a church to work next on creating those fun plans having joined together on our vision.



The program is pretty easy to learn. You don't have to be a computer expert!

A large part of our church family volunteers for worship positions: greeters, ushers, worship assistants, sound and projection technicians, and communion servers. We are most grateful to have so many willing participants! The schedules for most of these volunteer positions are filled months ahead of time and mailed out. Also, a copy of the schedule is kept outside the church office for you to check if you forget. The office sends out postcards to remind each volunteer when their week of service arrives, but it's easy to miss them. We're developing a way to also email you, so if you are out of town, you can still see the reminder. However, it is essential that if you find out you can't serve on your assigned Sunday, to please find a substitute among the other volunteers or switch places with them. At least, inform the office that you can't make it. This would be so helpful!

We're continually evolving how we record our services. The recent use of Facebook Live has been quite successful, though we have plans to improve the sound, particularly for the choir music. We welcome feedback about how you use the recordings and how the system can be improved! We want all to be able to worship with us, even if remotely!

Healing Prayer Ministry



Catherine Marshall wrote a wonderful book titled Beyond Ourselves. In this book is a chapter on “The Prayer of Relinquishment” and in this chapter she explains that we cannot experience God’s peace – the peace that passes understanding - until we relinquish everything to God. It’s not that we don’t care about anything other than God – it’s that we TRUST God with everything. Fear and love cannot take up the same space so if fear is in our heart there is no room for love and it’s the love that heals, reconciles, restores, energizes, gives us joy, and makes us whole. If we are focused on the thing that we are praying for – focused on how desperately we need that prayer to be answered, we are locked into fear mode because we know that His unconditional, everlasting love is the only thing He has promised us. We know there is a possibility that we may not get the answer to the specific prayer that we want. However, if our focus is on God and how much He loves us, treasures us and delights in us - if our focus is on God’s goodness and what His Son did for us, our hearts are full of love and that love has the power to affect this world in numerous and wonderful ways. That love has the power to help us believe it when we say – “God, you’ve got this.” When we LOVE God with all of our heart, soul, strength and mind and TRUST Him relinquishing

all of our life to Him, miracles happen.

Every Sunday morning after the worship service, pray-ers are in the front of the sanctuary on the left side by the wheel chair ramp who would love to pray with you to help you put your focus on the love and goodness of God so that you can relinquish your fears and receive His peace and His healing.

ALPC had a mission filled summer!

We celebrated Pentecost with donations going to PCUSA and to support our youth traveling to Houston. We collected funds to fill fifty grocery bags with snacks for distribution to CRS families. We received more than enough in cash donations, so we were able to send a contribution to LCM for the STEM summer camp. This LCM camp, with PACE students as counselors, had 120 children registered. They provided lunch to campers daily and to neighborhood children as well! Once again, Carol Madson volunteered to serve lunch to the children.

We organized a Saturday Mission day in Oberlin and Lorain for our members. NEXT Step staff gave us their day off to supervise work on ramps and windows. It was a memorable experience for all.

We arranged Monday dessert fellowship time with each missionary group that stayed at our church. Special thanks to the ALPC groups including CE and Youth, Worship and Spiritual Life, Deacons, Session, Mission and Annalyse Mabe for hosting and providing the treats for all our guests.

We collected 2¢-a-meal donations in coins and checks totaling over \$329 for the Presbytery hunger programs in July.

Looking ahead: October 7th is Peacemaking Sunday and November 4th & 11th we will be collecting food donations for "Holiday Meals".

AND let's not forget how we worked closely with the NEXT Step staff ...

Many of us agree that this was the best intern crew, ever. We say that every year, but this summer was impressive with the teamwork among our ALPC staff, NEXT Step staff, and the visiting missionaries.

Over 250 people called our church home this summer. They came from as far as Nebraska and as close as Westlake. They represented many denominations including Coptic Christians. Projects included several entrance ramps, some porch decking, painting and work on a preschool playground. Evidently lots of jack hammering concrete and asphalt and dry-walling too. We again enjoyed the Intern's music abilities during Sunday services. Hopefully, you were able to attend one of their worship times. The videos, music and testimonies were inspiring.

John Weeden, Deacon Co-Chair

I'm a foundation guy...I get calls from all kinds of different individuals whose basement walls have begun to fail, so they call and I go and try to help. Most of these calls come from homeowners whom, I realize are wonderful people, but there are a few homeowners who end up being hard to work with, and then some others who end up being crazy as the day is long...this is the story of one such homeowner, and the unexpected gift he ultimately gave me.

About a decade ago, I received a call from a man who was in need of my services. He lived in Westlake and owned a house whose basement walls leaked; one of which had pushed in to the point of needing to be excavated, then totally torn out and replaced with new concrete block and mortar. He seemed normal enough as I went through the typical process of setting up an appointment, meeting with him, evaluating his foundation issues, drafting a quote with my proposed work, then finally submitting the bid to him, which in the end, he reluctantly accepted.

His name was Jerry, he was an old Irish man through and through. Jerry was retired, in his late 70's, and didn't stand much taller than 5' high. Throughout our work at his house, he would periodically appear from out of nowhere, and ask questions like "Hey John, will my walls be as waterproof as a screened door when you're done?", or "Hey John, should I buy my bait now for the trout stream I'll have running through my basement after your done?...and without fail his favorite question of all would be posed to me at the end of the day, "Hey John...can I get you a beer?"

Several days I would need to decline because I had other obligations...bids I needed to go on, or proposals I needed to write, but on the days I would accept, we would sit on his back patio and drink and talk. Like a ping pong match, we would take turns trading tales of mischievousness throughout each of our own individual lives. It seemed that we both would laugh again and again at the others stories, not because we felt we should...our laughter was sincere, coming from that wonderful place where heartfelt joy is born...Ends up I found old Jerry to be interesting, intelligent, and a whole lot of fun!

About a month after his job was completed, I began receiving voicemail's from him...sometimes four or five months would pass between them, and sometimes I would get three in the same week..."Hey John, it's Jerry, where are you at... in prison? Meet me for a beer...call me back pal.", or "Hey John, it's Jerry, did the IRS finally catch up to you? Meet me at that little pub by your house... you can buy me a beer."



So we would periodically meet at Close Quarter's pub, the tiny bar which sits only a short walk up the road from my home. Many times it was only the owner of the bar, and only bartender at the time, Harry Schindler, myself, and the man, who through his many stories I came to learn, was known to most as "The Westlake Wacko...Jerry Glasby." Harry would read his newspaper from behind the bar and half listen as Jerry and I sipped our beers, and traded stories with each other. Jerry would talk about his early life working at The Cleveland Press, then evolving with the paper which we now know as The Cleveland Plain Dealer, including all the details of his antics with his coworkers in a time that the "unimaginable" was tolerated in the work place.

Harry and I would share stories of our own past, and of the pub 30 years ago right after he purchased it, which incidentally was about 3 years AFTER I first sat down there. We talked about the days where there were no bathrooms in the pub, and you would need to use the bathrooms of the rental house behind the bar, which came as a package deal when Harry purchased it....and yes, we would sit and talk and laugh about all of the "unimaginable" antics that were tolerated in the early days of Close Quarters too.

Inevitably, after a couple of beers, Jerry would place his hand on my shoulder, move in a little closer so I would not miss a word that he was about to say, then quote some relevant bits of wisdom from Thoreau, or Walt Whitman, or Nietzsche that related to our conversation. Harry and I would look at each other, then back at Jerry, gifting him with a nod of our head or the raise of an eyebrow...then Harry or I would explain to Jerry that he was absolutely full of "it", then we'd all start laughing. With my busy schedule, it was typically a struggle breaking away to meet Jerry...but I was always... always glad I did.

This ritual went on for several years, until one day I received a solemn message from Jerry "Hey pal, it's Jerry...call me." Hearing the tone of his voice, it was clear to me that something was wrong, so with trepidation, I called him back ...

He answered "Hello." "Hey Jerry, it's John. I got your message...what's going on man?"

"Hey John...did you hear pal?" "What are you talking about...hear what?" "Did you hear about Harry?...he died pal."

My heart immediately dropped...I had to pull my dump truck over to the side of the road. It was like I was suddenly thrown into this weird unexpected alter-universe where suddenly, nothing seemed real. Jerry had no other details about it, he said a friend of his told him earlier that day, but no other words really seemed to penetrate me after he said "he died pal.."

I thanked Jerry for thinking of me and ended our call. I sat in my truck looking out my window on the side of the road... stunned. Strangely everything looked a bit different now...I tried remembering the last time I was in "The Quarter," the last time I saw him, but I couldn't. I only knew it had been a long time.

It was 2 in the afternoon, 2 hours before the bar would typically open its doors, but with the death of Harry I knew it would be closed today, and probably for a long time after today too...maybe permanently. I just wanted to see it...I don't know why...so I knew it was real maybe... Harry was gone now, maybe the Pub was gone too... I really didn't know why, I just wanted to see it right then with my own eyes. A feeling of uneasiness filled me as I approached the small pub, my heart sank again as I pulled in and saw Harry's car parked behind the bar, and a silhouette of a figure through the window...

The words "Oh my God, it must be Carol" ran through my mind. Carol is Harry's wife. I parked my truck, took a deep breath, then opened my door. I wanted to go in and tell her how sorry I was to hear about Harry. I wanted to tell her that although I was just another guy in their bar, and Harry a bartender, that I liked him and cared for him, and my heart hurt because he was gone...and it just didn't seem real, or right that he was gone. I just wanted to put my arms around her, and tell her "I'm so sorry Carol." but the appropriate words seemed to escape me...so wounded with no script I opened the back door of the pub and walked in with a lump in my throat. At the sound of the closing door, the figure behind the bar turned to me...and to my astonishment...there stood Harry.

Overwhelmed with illation and confusion, I took several strides towards him, then with no thought, I wrapped my arms around him and squeezed him as tight as I could... not only out of the unexpected joy of seeing that Harry wasn't gone, but also maybe to know that he was real.

In his typical disapproving monotone voice, Harry said "What the hell are you doing, John?"

I responded "I heard you were dead!"

Then again in his typical fashion, Harry said very matter-of-factly, "Nope."

I looked at him with tears in my eyes, then we both started laughing hysterically.

I spent the rest of that afternoon sipping beer and talking with Harry. I blew my afternoon off, and I couldn't care less...at that moment nothing else really seemed to matter. He prepped the fryers while I slowly sipped my beer, and reminisced about all the characters that used to frequent the pub. We talked and laughed. I told him he always made my wife's chicken wings too hot...he insisted that she liked them that way, he absolutely knew it because according to him, once she had complained that they weren't hot enough, so any time after that, despite our pleading with him, he insisted on making them extra hot! We laughed about "fricking Glasby" thinking Harry was actually dead, then laughed as I explained in detail how I was going to verbally berate him for it, the first chance I had. Just the two of us sat and talked and laughed...it was emotional, and sweet, and sentimental, and unexpected, and really beautiful.

Later that year Harry Schindler actually died...

Everyday our lives pass by, with people moving in and out of them, at light speed it seems. Search your heart for the ones who touched you...I know it must sound so strange...but push yourself to grieve their deaths before they have actually left this world...feel every emotion within your loss, remember your time spent together, contemplate exactly how they impacted your life, understand their significance...then come hell or high water, go out and find them... You see, something incredible happens when you mourn the loss of a loved one... You expand the capacity of your heart...This strange place where our hearts push their limits to feel a deeper pain, a deeper love...is the absolute place where miracles happen.

As I sit in front of my computer, I realize it is time for me to look up ole Glasby...it has certainly been too long since we sat side by side hearing him quote a famous author, and sipping a beer... and I need him to know that.
