Pastor's Passage



**“Be still, and know that I am God!”
Psalm 46:10a (NRSV)**

Everybody told me to relax and get away from church on our vacation. That was the plan except I did not get my newsletter article done. So I thought I'd better write it and send it off to Kenzi. Thank you Kenzi for your patience and grace. I hope I did not hold you up as you were putting it together.

Mary and I are with our friends at their family cottage on Washington Island, Wisconsin. There is one big room where everyone hangs out so it serves as a multi-purpose room. The only heat we have is the fireplace so you definitely have to layer-up when you go to bed.

I am sitting at the table, next to the fire, looking out across Detroit Harbor watching the ferry boats come and go. The ferry boats had not been running the past two days because of the wind. We've had sustained winds at 25-35 mph, with gusts reaching over 50 mph. The waves were 7-10 feet high as they crashed ashore (luckily not in the harbor where we are staying). The

ferry line deemed it not safe to go out on the water most of Monday and all of Tuesday. We heard that there were 28' waves out in Lake Michigan. It is now Wednesday and things are calming down and getting back to normal.

The Islanders (us included) took everything in stride; what else could we do? People who had travel plans or flights to catch on Tuesday or Wednesday left the island by Sunday afternoon. Everyone knew the winds were coming so plans were changed so there would not be much disruption.

Disruptions in our lives can come unexpectedly and we can be caught off guard. This can cause stress and anxiety and throw us for a loop. Disruptions are a form of change and we all know how we react to change. Sometimes, we are able to just go with the flow. Other times, it can create havoc in our lives.

When sudden changes occur, often times I press the pause button in my life. I'll survey what is going on before making a decision about what to do (with Mary's input, of course...most of the time; I'm not perfect). Sometimes, change needs an immediate response so I/we make the best decision I/we can at the time and pray it was the right

decision.

As we go through the transition process to hire a new full-time minister, we might be faced with changes. I don't believe that any changes that might occur will be sudden or that we will be caught off guard. But some changes may have to be faced.

Your Transition Team had its first meeting on October 8 and will meet again on the 29th, before you receive this newsletter. Members of the team are: Craig Shoemaker, Sybil Wendling, Anita Cheriyan, Shawn Brunner, Sarah Waggoner, Bill Hamilton, and myself.

Our challenge is to help learn what the church's strengths and weaknesses are; how might we become better disciples of Christ? Can we do a better job of reaching out to our community? Where do we see ourselves 5-10 years down the road? What we all accomplish (the team and the congregation) will help the Pastor Nominating Committee determine what kind of pastor we will need to help us reach our goals.

As this process unfolds, we would be wise to listen to the words of the psalmist to be still. If we do this, we will hear the word of God.

Sometimes our stories are short. Sometimes our stories are so funny we can hardly get them out. Other stories are so sad they make us feel like we have a lump in our throat so big that we just cannot push out the words. We wait for just the right time or just the right person to share our stories with.

My Grandma was a storyteller. I remember a snowy winter day that Grandma and I were snuggled on the couch and were the only two at home. She told me a story about being courted by a young man who picked her up in a horse and buggy

to go for a ride on a long-ago snowy day. She was, however, mortified that her Mom had arranged for her younger brother to ride along as chaperone. Her brother, the little chaperone, thought it was a great idea. I am so glad that she shared her story. Her story is now my story.

My Mom was a storyteller, too. Earaches were not uncommon and I had my share. In addition to remembering the pain, I remember that my Mom would give me baby aspirin and lie down in bed with me and tell me a story. Most often it

was about Mrs. Mouse, who built her house in an empty match box and cared for her little mice who made the beds, tidied up the matchbox and sometimes trudged off to the kitchen to drag home some cheese. At the time, the story distracted me enough that I drifted off to sleep. Of course, this story is not really about mice. It is about a loving Mom who creatively used a story for comfort.

Telling stories AND listening to stories? I would love to hear yours!


Library News

I have changed out some of the books on display in the foyer. Feel free to enjoy them and check one out if you want to take it with you.






The Love Languages of God by Gary Chapman: A follow-up on his books about love languages in human relationships. These are a reflection of God's love, as we are made in God's image.









Session Highlights

The Session met on October 24 – Highlights of their meeting were:

- Approved all the dates in 2023 when Communion will be served.
- Received a report from Terry Vine and Matt Wendling who attended the very long Presbytery stated meeting.
- The Deacons sponsored a trunk in Trunk or Treat.
- The Deacons will be busy assisting with several events in November and December.
- September's expenses exceeded income by \$3,300, and the Legacy Fund was down \$5,500 in value.
- A motion was approved to use the carryover funds from 2020 to replenish the Permanent Improvement Fund, which was used on the restroom renovation project.
- \$1,270 was raised for the Guatemala mission team. Thank you to all donors!
- All members were sent a stewardship letter.
- Additional interviews for CE Director will be held.
- The adult education classes have started and are held after worship services.
- The sewer line at the west end backed up, and a plumber was brought in to unplug it.
- The replacement of the heat pump for the east end will cost around \$25,000. It has exceeded its 20-year life expectancy by about ten years.
- Peacemaking donations will be sent to the Presbytery.
- Eighteen pounds of candy, plus pens and literature, were handed out by those who participated in the homecoming parade.
- Alternate ways to safely serve Communion are being explored, as the current pre-packaged elements are often too hard to open.
- The Blue Christmas service will be called "Healing Hearts".
- Pastor Rick has a really nice children's moment planned for the 7:30pm Christmas Eve service.
- He will begin serving home Communion with the help of the Deacons.
- The transition team is now regularly meeting.



