



Pastor's Passage

But strive first for the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well. So do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will bring worries of its own. Today's trouble is enough for today.

Matthew 6:33-34 (NRSV)

Our transition is now fully underway. Your Transition Team has been working quietly behind the scenes since prior to the Advent Season. As I write this newsletter for March, we will have had our first congregational gathering concerning our future.

As you already know, the Transition Team had asked you to think about three questions prior to this gathering. These questions were:

1. What is the one thing in congregational life that supports your life and gives you satisfaction? i.e. small group involvement, worship participation, etc.
2. What is God calling us to do as a congregation? Now and in the future. What are our strengths?
3. What characteristics do we need in a future leader(s)/ pastor(s)?

I have stated earlier that the team is also using the ALPC ReNewal Study that you undertook prior to Covid as a baseline to work from.

I can't say enough good things about your Transition Team. The members are: Bill Hamilton, Sarah Waggoner, Sybil Wendling, Shawn

Brunner, Anita Cheriyan, and Craig Shoemaker. We have prayed together seeking God's wisdom and guidance. We have spent time doing our best to discern what direction we should go and how to lead you on this journey. We believe that the Holy Spirit is working through us.

I have been your pastor for 13 1/2 months. I became your full-time Transitional Pastor in the middle of May, 2022. You might be asking yourself, "Why has it taken so long to get moving?" That is a fair question. I trusted that the Holy Spirit would let us know when the time was right. That time is now. We are now in a good place to move consistently forward.

When I arrived things were just not right. The church had only begun worshipping in person since late summer 2021. You had been worshipping online as a community of faith, which was very impressive and a lot of hard work for many people.

I am not sure everyone understood the undertaking that online worship took to put together. It looks very seamless when watching but it was a stressful time for those who worked hard to make it happen. You were blessed to have such a dedicated group that

made it happen and continues to make it happen. They are a special group.

It was upon your return to in-person worship that you were informed that Pastor Charlie would need to retire at the end of the year. To feel hopeful that things would slowly begin to return to some sense of normalcy and be shocked by the news about your pastor leaving was a gut punch. These two things, worshipping remotely for such a long time and Pastor Charlie's unforeseen retirement, were very impactful on congregational life.

In all honesty, it has taken this long to reach the point of "a return to normalcy." Whether you sensed it or not, we have continually moved forward since my arrival. We have been "Always on the move... in God's time."

This is the place where it might feel like we are just treading water. I have learned, sometimes the hard way, that my time and God's time are not always in sync. And waiting on God can, at times, be frustrating. But as I said earlier, now is the time; now is God's time.

When you read this, we will be in the season of Lent. Purple is the liturgical color for Lent, and the sanctuary and other Lent related items will feature this color.

The title of the Lenten worship series is “Ready for a Change”. This is appropriate not only because our church is facing changes as we search for a new pastor, but we, both individually and collectively, can use this time to face the inevitable changes in our lives, looking to grow closer to God, following Jesus more closely, and living in the power of the Holy Spirit. Of course, these two purposes will work in tandem as we grow spiritually and move into the vision God has called us to!

Road signs will be used to illustrate the topics dealt with in this series. “Change Ahead” will be the main one. When traveling on the highway, road signs are very useful as we navigate to our destination. May this series help us discern and navigate the direction the Holy Spirit is taking us!

As in previous years, we will have palms for everyone on Palm Sunday. This year, Pastor Rick will have us gather in the foyer and enter the sanctuary together in procession, waving the palms, and shouting “Hosanna!”

On Easter, we will gather at dawn by Lake Erie to celebrate the Resurrection as the sun rises, and again in the sanctuary at 10am

among the beauty of music and flowers. The Deacons will serve a breakfast in between to encourage our festive fellowship.

The Elders of Jazz will return on the Sunday after Easter to help us continue rejoicing together. Historically, this Sunday has been called “low Sunday”, since it followed the high of Easter, but not at our church! We get to have joyful Jazz that day!

We welcome feedback on worship and encourage you to attend one of our committee meetings to see the hard and faithful work we do to help all encounter the presence of God during worship.

The Session met on February 20. Highlights of their meeting were:

- ◆ At the end of January, we had excess receipts, primarily because some members pay their entire pledge early in the year. Thanks to all for their generosity!
- ◆ The per capita payment of \$9,000 was paid, with about \$4,000 collected so far from members. Members can still pay their per capita to help bring down this expense.
- ◆ Options for accounting software will be explored now that QuickBooks no longer supports the version we use.
- ◆ More members are giving using the Simple Give kiosk and QR code.
- ◆ Two applications have come in for the CE Director job, and interviews will be held soon.
- ◆ HR will reach out to area churches looking for more suitable applicants.
- ◆ An Easter egg hunt will be held again on Palm Sunday.
- ◆ Two companies will be submitting estimates for the furnace replacement.
- ◆ A contractor is being sought to remove the overgrown Bradford pear trees.
- ◆ Pastor Rick is helping the Evangelism Committee update the church brochure.
- ◆ The Clerk submitted the church statistical report for 2022.
- ◆ Kenzi is making professional quality signs for the Ready for a Change worship series. We truly appreciate her skillset!
- ◆ The organ has been repaired and new power outlets for it positioned on the sides of the chancel platform.
- ◆ The Nominating Committee will be seeking members for the Pastor Nominating Committee.
- ◆ Pastor Rick and the Transition Team will schedule a second event for the congregation to review the results of the first event.
- ◆ A liaison from the Presbytery will work with the Pastor Nominating Committee once it forms.
- ◆ Pastor Rick feels there are a lot of positives in our church to attract a new pastor.
- ◆ The pictures of the elders and deacons in the foyer will be updated.
- ◆ Donors to the Youth Mission Fund have opted to leave their donations in place for a future youth mission trip. Thank you for such generosity!
- ◆ Amendments to the Book of Order, our denomination's constitution, are being voted on at the next Presbytery meeting. Two of our elders will be voting.

If you prefer worshipping in the sanctuary, coffee and tea are always available after the service.


Library Updates

Around Christmas, I put out some books related to the season, which I hope you noticed. These have been changed out with some new books about moving forward in this new year and discovering things about ourselves.




Here are the books I just put out on display:







We Are Here Now by Patrick Keifert: As we enter an era of Post-Christendom, we can welcome this as a new era of mission for our local church.




Making a Love that Lasts by Jacob Aranza: Real experiences are combined with godly principles in this book for teens about the gift of sex.

Durufé - Requiem, Op. 9 - Palm Sunday Concert

afternoon, 3:00 p.m. Concert with the TrueNorth Chorale and Chamber Orchestra performing *The Requiem*, Op. 9, a 1947 setting of the Latin Requiem by Maurice Durufé for solo voice, mixed choir, and chamber orchestra with organ. Maurice Durufé's

Requiem (1947) created a requiem where the main idea is not death and scenes of the Day of Judgement (as it was with Mozart, Verdi and Berlioz), but rather Faith, Rest, Peace and Love. **Mundy Thursday** will be a time of reflection and prayer once again as we reflect on the moments in the garden and the last supper. **Good Friday** we will have noontime worship and prayer. **Easter Sunday**, both the Handbell and Chancel Choirs will lead us musically, along with a brass ensemble; worship will be filled with joy as we celebrate Christ's resurrection. He is Alive! He is Alive Indeed!!!!




