Orkney and Finding God in the Ordinary

A number of years ago, Susanne and I got the chance to visit the Isle of Orkney. This is a small island that is about a two-hour ferry ride north of Scotland. While it is technically part of Scotland, it has its own culture due to its unique geography and its distance from Scotland and other Northern European countries. Two things about Orkney's geography are relevant to what I want to share.

First, the island historically has very few native trees due to the dramatic

winds that it has all year. This is important because this means that any civilization that lived on the island used rock to build anything that they needed. So, the island is rich with ruins and archeological sites dating back at least 5,000 years. I fact, Orkney has some of the world's oldest and best-preserved Neolithic sites, with more being discovered each year.

Second, Orkney was rich with fishing, farming, and other items necessary for living there. In other words, the ancient cultures that lived there did not need to fight for survival. This means that they had time for religion and art.

There are huge standing stones everywhere and beautifully preserved stone circles, burial mounds, and tombs. Each one is different, yet mysteriously connected. Anthropologists and archeologists are still trying to figure out the meaning of much of what was built. When Susanne and I were there, it was easy to feel inspired by the sacredness of what we saw.

Why is this important? Because those on Orkney (continued on page 13)

# Christian Education Highlights

### <u>C.R.O.S.S.</u>

C.R.O.S.S. stands for Children Raised On Sunday School. At ALPC, our Sunday School program is designed to cultivate a deep and meaningful understanding of faith in our young learners. We believe that early exposure to biblical teachings and Christian values lays a solid foundation for a lifetime of spiritual growth. Key elements of our current curriculum and what we hope our children will be getting out of C.R.O.S.S. this year:

- Bible Literacy—our children are engaging with the Bible in a structured and hands-on way. They are learning the stories of the Bible, diving into a different one each week and learning about the characters and the lessons each story imparts. Additionally, we are working on memorizing the order of the books in the Bible, aiming to make children familiar with its structure and content.
- Fruit of the Spirit—we emphasize the development of character traits that reflect the Fruits of the Spirit as described in Galatians 5:22-23. Children learn how the virtues of Love, Joy, and Peace can impact their interactions with others. They learn the importance of practicing traits such as Patience, Kindness, and Goodness in their daily lives. And, children work on developing qualities such as Faithfulness, Gentleness, and Self-Control as they grow in their faith journeys.
- Fellowship—building a sense of community is a main focus of our program. We encourage children to participate in group activities, promoting teamwork and friendship, as well as ageappropriate service projects to instill a sense of responsibility and compassion for others.

By providing a nurturing and educational environment, we aim to support the spiritual journey of our children, helping them to grow in their faith and understanding of God's word. We are excited to see how these teachings take root and flourish in their lives this program year and the years to come.

#### **Children's Sermons**

Children's Sermons will be conducted on the second and last Sunday of each month. In December, we will hold a children's sermon every Sunday in celebration of Advent.

#### **Revival Youth Group**

Over the past two months, we have successfully fortunate to ben establish our youth group, which meets on the second and last Sunday of each month. Currently, our attendance stands at six participants. As part of our Revival Youth Group, we have dedicated our efforts to fostering supportive and enriching а environment for teenagers. Key focus areas we have been working on and are still continuing to grow in as we navigate throughout the year are:

- Identity in Christ—understanding and embracing one's identity in Christ is foundational for young believers. We delve into what it means to be a new creation in Christ and how this identity influences everyday decisions and relationships.
- Building Resilience—in a rapidly changing world, resilience is an essential trait. We focus on equipping our youth with the tools and mindset needed to overcome challenges and grow from experiences.
- Service & Outreach—Encouraging acts of service and outreach helps teenagers see the impact of faith in action. We organize community

service projects and outreach programs to demonstrate the love of Christ to others.

- Healthy Relationships—navigating relationships can be complex, especially as a teenager. We discuss how to form and maintain healthy, respectful relationships that honor God and reflect His love.
- Prayer & Spiritual Practices developing a strong prayer life and engaging in spiritual practices are crucial for spiritual growth. We guide our youth in exploring different ways to connect with God and deepen their faith.

We closed out October with our theme "Out of the Darkness." We reflected on the light we project onto others and consider how the brightness of others can illuminate our own paths. We also examined what it means to have Jesus in our hearts and how our choices influence the radiance of His presence within us. As teenagers navigating through a world filled with various influences and challenges, it's crucial to understand the importance of living as lights in the darkness. In Ephesians 5:8-14, the apostle Paul urges believers to walk as children of light, exposing the darkness around them. This passage is especially relevant for teenagers as they encounter moral dilemmas, peer pressure, and societal norms that may conflict with their faith. Understanding how to shine the light of Christ in the darkness of the world is essential for teenagers to grow in their faith, stand firm in their convictions, and positively impact their surroundings. Through this lesson, we explored what it means to live as children of light and how we can practically apply this principle in our lives as teenagers.

### It's Not About Me by Max Lucado





Bob Dylan penned this popular tune, with the obvious focus — changing times. It suits us well at present. While some "traditions" will be continued this Advent season, we can all expect new things as a new Pastor leads our church.

One of our traditions will continue with the Hanging of the Greens on November 24 upon conclusion of the morning serv ice. Our faithful deacons will provide a light lunch, and we ask that you provide helping hands in getting our sanctuary and narthex ready for Advent. We will again have our "Family Tree," upon which the children can place their handmade ornaments, and adults can bring "ornaments of meaning" from home to display. We look forward to repeating our "presentation of the Nativity pieces" each Sunday in Advent, with the scene expanding and unfolding each week. We will be looking for volunteers to present a new piece or pieces each Sunday. Lighting of the candles will also continue with a twist — candle lighting volunteers WON'T HAVE TO SPEAK! You read that correctly — the scripts will be read for you (unless you choose to read them), and all you need to do is come forward and light the candles. Sign-ups for these events will be in the narthex.

Worship and Spiritual Life Committee is preparing to purchase a super-sized wreath to hang on the south exterior wall of the church, and plans are underway for a new, enhanced outdoor crèche.

Beyond that, Advent will likely bring new approaches, styles, and emphases this year. We await their discovery with eager anticipation, knowing that all will be done decently, and in order. While these "traditions" continue, Bob Dylan warned us — change lies ahead. With that, allow me to share a short story with you.

A new camp commander observed two soldiers guarding a bench. He inquired as to the reason for this task. He was informed that the last commander had given instructions to perform the duty, and they believed it was some sort of regimental duty. The commander located new and contacted the previous commander. who explained that the commander preceding him had continued those orders. Reaching back three more commanders, the puzzled officer finally found the originator of those orders, and asked the significance of the guarded bench. The aged gentleman responded, "What?! Is the paint still wet??"

Sometimes there are valid reasons for change, sometimes not. But changing times are ahead of us, and rather than resist, perhaps we should step away from our guard posts, and embrace the change.

Are there any of you that feel like the reverse is true? That we are so focused on surviving that religion takes a back seat??

Life is constantly changing, introducing new challenges with family, work, school, shopping, eating, travel. The list is different for each of us, but the result can be the same. Religion and spirituality take a back seat.

Rather than suggest that we add it back into our lives (adding one more thing to a long list you already have), I'm going to invite you (all of us, really ) to remember God, who God is, and that God never leaves us, even when we are busy and struggling to survive.

Remember that in Exodus, God's chosen people wandered the desert for forty years trying to stay alive and get through. Forty years in a desert! It is not an easy place to live and is quite unforgiving. Yet, in every moment God never abandoned them.

Nehemiah 9:19 reminds us of that time in Exodus: Speaking to God, "You, in your great compassion did not forsake them in the wilderness; the pillar of cloud that led them in the way did not leave them by day, nor the pillar of fire by night that gave them light on the way by which they should go."


We can be busy, stressed, or facing a great challenge.

God never leaves.


God is always there even when we are not reaching out.
