Session Highlights

- The Deacons gave the Cornerstone teachers appreciation packets.
- ◆ The Deacons' ride service can be arranged by calling the Deacons Moderator, Sybil Wendling, instead of the church office.
- A preliminary schedule of Deacons events has been planned through March.
- ◆ The church budget at the end of August was in the red by over \$4,000, with receipts below budget by \$11,000. It is hoped giving picks up in the fall to correct the shortfall.
- Materials to help plan the Stewardship campaign are being gathered.
- Human Resources is putting together a welcome binder for the new pastor.

- A calendar with staff schedules will be displayed in the church office.
- Kicking off the Revival Youth Group is a priority this year for the Christian Education Committee.
- The youth room is being renovated and new furnishings and technology are needed for it.
- A confirmation class will be offered this year.
- Repairs were made to the front playground.
- ◆ The Cornerstone Advisory Committee will be providing Session with regular financial reports.
- The leaking roof with the skylights will be repaired for about \$1,700.
- Frequent maintenance of that flat roof will be needed to prevent future leaks.

- Donations this Christmas will go toward gift cards for foster children.
- The local portion of the Peace and Global Witness Offering will go to the Valor Home.
- Pajamas, as well as socks, will be collected for Socktober.
- A new member informational packet is being prepared for future new members, with a team ready to help integrate new members into the life of the church.
- TrueNorth was approved to use our sanctuary for their December concert.
- The purchase of a new, lit wreath for the front of the building was approved.
- The Nominating Committee will be seeking four new deacons and four new elders.

At the end of July, we were at essentially a breakeven point with income only slightly above expenditures. In August, our expenses exceeded income for the first time in a long time. While we had projected a

deficit budget, this is the first month where we have fallen behind and had to use savings to cover our expenses. If you have fallen behind with your giving over the summer, please try to catch up. If you can give a little extra, that would also be greatly appreciated.

Letters of John

Join us Tuesdays in the Session Room, 1:30-2:30 p.m.

In his letters, John expresses delight at believers who are "walking in the truth" — behaving with that integrity which reflects the gospel. This involves not just correct doctrine and proper outward behavior, but also love for God and fellow believers. It's this love, John writes, that shows that the truth of the gospel has really been grasped, not as an abstract idea, but as what it is, the very life of God himself at work in his people. These nine studies from Tom Wright help us become believers who are "walking in the truth" in our own day — people in whom the very life of God is at work for all to see. The Lettes of John, found in the New Testament of the Bible are a set of three epistles traditionally attributed to John the Apostle. These letters are known as 1 John, 2 John, and 3 John. They are rich in theological insights and offer guidance on Christian living, community, and the nature of God.

1 John Themes: Love and Fellowship, Light and Darkness, Truth and Deception

2 John Themes: Truth and Love, Hospitality

3 John Themes: Hospitality and Support, Leadership and Authority

Revival Youth
