Currently there is a beautiful lemon crème color that is reminiscent of the soft golden sunlight at dawn or a bridesmaid's dress from the late 1960s (yes, I have been looking at old pictures recently). Nevertheless, it is a color that was chosen many years ago. It is in need of a touch-up and also of being revisited to see if it is still the right color for where we are now.

The color might change, but not the walls. And yet, even if the walls were to change, the function of the pastoral office would not. It is a place to work, pray, study, talk, listen, write, read, laugh, cry, and have fun. No matter what color is chosen for the walls, or what location the bookcases or desk

end up, the function of the office is sustained.

service. Have patience with us as we try new things, laugh with us when things clash unintentionally, and celebrate with us when we hit the mark, finding the harmony between liturgy and worshiping God.

Who knows, I might keep the yellow in my office, knowing that is a good color that a lot of people enjoy. (I might change only one wall or leave one yellow wall; time will tell.) Sometimes what you have is still really good because it works. In the meantime, we're going to see where our creative ideas take us so long as they don't take away from the purpose and meaning of our activity and keep us centered on God. Come on this journey with us, seeking God's heart and responding to Jesus' invitation to, "come, follow me."

Did you wonder what happened to all the beautiful crochet and knitted hats and scarves from ALPC's Yarn Ministry that were displayed a few weeks ago? Well, last Wednesday, I delivered four boxes of those items to Church of the Redeemer in Lorain. They are working with two other churches to give away those hats and scarves at their community meals and food pantries.

- The Deacons have monthly events planned all the way until summer. Stay tuned!
- ◆ In October, expenses exceeded income again, though the YTD deficit is not as large as budgeted. Members are encouraged to help erase the deficit.
- ◆ The reimbursement forms used in the office will be modified to help track the committee budget line itmes the expenses are applied to.
- Some stewardship pledges have already been turned in.
- A new financial secretary may be needed in the new year.
- Office hours will be posted in the bulletin each week, obviating the

need for a schedule board in the office.

- A program for direct depositing staff checks will be investigated.
- The employee manual will be updated to reflect the handling of regular and overtime hours.
- Cornerstone Preschool is willing to install awnings over the kitchen and youth foyer entrances.
- The Cornerstone Preschool tuition for the 2025-26 school year was approved.
- The Cornerstone Preschool drop-off pattern was deemed not a sufficient cause of delay.
- Our volunteers for Grandparents' Day at Cornerstone had a lot of fun.
- Pastor Kristian is encouraging Session to give thought to efficient use of our spaces.

- The Fix-it Saturdays have been very successful, with up to 12 participants fixing many things!
- Money for turkeys was donated, so the meals we donate will have turkeys this year.
- Mission has a goal to raise \$1000 for the Open Hearts program to provide for youth in foster care.
- Evangelism has plans to promote our family-friendly services at the Cornerstone Christmas program.
- New cards for prayer requests, visitors, and getting involved are being designed for the pew racks.
- A family-friendly service and a traditional service will be held on Christmas Eve.
- Sign-ups are being taken to light the Advent candles and place nativity figures. No speaking parts!



Financial Report

As we near the end of 2024, please help us stay financially sound so we can continue to do all the good things we have been doing and be in a position to do any new things that God is calling us to do. As you can see below, this year's giving is almost \$30,000 behind our anticipated giving. Spending is about \$32,000 behind

what was anticipated, so that is helping, but we need to turn things around. Our overall deficit so far this year is about \$8,500. In the past when we have anticipated a deficit, the generosity of this congregation has kept us from having to use savings. If you have fallen behind with your giving, please try to catch up. If you can give a little extra, that would also be greatly appreciated.

There is absolutely no doubt that ALPC is a Mission Outreach church! Our budget was nearing zero in November. But, our church members provided turkeys and grocery money to insure the families that needed some help got all they needed for a harvest feast. And, of course, all the donations from Cornerstone families and ALPC members and guests are a blessing.

This December we have three opportunities for meaningful gift giving. The first is **Operation Open Heart.** Kathy Leopold will share their story Sunday, December 1. This group has mentored kids in foster care for more than sixty years! We would like to help them this Christmas with funds to buy a gift card for each child in the program. Donations may be made payable to ALPC noted "Operation Open Heart."

Christmas Joy is a PCUSA annual offering that focuses on retired

pastors, church workers, and their families. Please take a look at the flyers with your December bulletins. Like many of us, it's hard to put aside money to cover unexpected illnesses or injuries. Pastors and church employees often have a more difficult time because pensions and benefit packages are not "standardized." This special offering is a way to help the people that have committed their time and talents to others. There are special envelopes for your donation or you can write "Christmas Joy" on your check or deposit.

The third way to help others is our Christmas Eve offering for the Mission Outreach fund. Mission Outreach is the "budget" for mission activities like the sixty brown bag lunches and 60-80 hot meals each month for families residing at Haven Center shelter. The shelter is for people without housing (including single women). We also help support Lorain Cooperative Ministries (LCM) which includes sister churches in

Lorain County. They provide food pantries, help with documents like birth certificates, transportation help, medical help including medicine and even a low-cost or free clothing store. Valor Home and Community Resource Services (CRS) are also part of our donation group.

We are blessed to be able to work with organizations in Lorain County. We are currently the only Presbyterian Church in the county that does. We feel called to help locally whenever we can.

We welcome your comments, suggestions, and of course, your financial support. We meet the first week of each month.


Property Report


Rick and Joan joined Santa at Light Up the Park for caroling a few years ago. Come enjoy the festivities with us this year!

Avon Lake Presbyterian Church will be hosting the TrueNorth Christmas concert on Saturday, December 21 at 7:30 p.m. Come experience glorious Christmas music and celebrate the season with the TrueNorth Chorale and Chamber Orchestra! Experience beautiful Christmas carols arranged by Dan Forrest and Mack Wilberg. Carols will include Away in a Manger, In the Bleak Midwinter, Joy to the World, O Come All Ye Faithful, Silent Night, The First Noel, and others. The string section of the Chamber Orchestra will be featured playing Arcangelo Corelli's Christmas Concerto — Concerto grosso in G minor, Op. 6, No. 8. The Chamber Orchestra will be performing Randol Alan Bass' The Night Before Christmas. Flutist Cathy Graves will join in a performance of Kevin Oldham's arrangement of Silent Night, a sensitive, almost restrained and ethereal rendering with simplicity and poignant clarity. The Choral and Chamber Orchestra will follow this piece by performing Dan Forrest's Silent Night, beginning with the smallest and simplest of musical ideas to paint, "Silent Night... all is calm," then gradually building into an overwhelming statement of the profoundest of truths: "Christ, the Savior, is born."

Another special feature will be Dan Forrest's Let the Stable Still Astonish. The calligrapher artist, Timothy Botts, has been commissioned to create an art piece inspired by the text and music which will be presented/premiered at this concert. "Let the stable still astonish" reminds us to find wonder in the unexpected and ordinary aspects of life, not just the grand or spectacular. The "stable" represents not just the physical place in Bethlehem, but also the humble, sometimes overlooked parts of our lives or hearts where God can be present. The word "astonish" implies a deep sense of awe and amazement. The piece has spoken to us throughout our preparation in rehearsal and we look forward to sharing it through this upcoming Concert.

Advent is here! We tend to think of Advent as a time to prepare for Christmas. But how? Are we occupied with decorating, sending cards, making gift lists and buying gifts, baking cookies, hosting people for a holiday meal? Or do we have special devotions each day, lighting Advent candles and making room in our hearts for Jesus? Think back to what you've read in the Bible about what people did before the birth of Jesus. I don't think they did any of the previous

acts. Mary, Mother of Jesus, likely did the most in preparing for the birth of her son. Back then, people indeed were awaiting the coming of the Messiah. But they didn't know when he would arrive. Perhaps Advent now is actually a time of waiting. Have you considered it to be a time when we think about waiting for the second coming of Christ? That is something I have read in more than one place. What does that look like? It can be different for different people. Certainly in our congregation we decorate the church and light candles on the Advent wreath. Not because it makes our church pretty, but to enhance our spiritual experience during this time.

Starting December 1, we will be lighting the candles on our Advent wreath each Sunday. The candles stand for hope, peace, joy, and love. On Christmas Eve, the Christ candle will be lit. Families and small groups are invited to volunteer to light the candles and to bring forth elements of the Nativity while Kristian reads liturgy appropriate to each candle. If you are interested in taking part, please sing up in the narthex or contact Lee Lohr. There will be two services on Christmas Eve — a casual family service at 4:30 p.m. and a traditional candlelight service at 9:00 p.m. Please note the new times.
